1.2 – Introduction to Foundations in Fasting

- The Two-fold Purpose for Writing on Fasting:
 - 1. to raise the awareness that fasting is a spiritual discipline.
 - 2. too many Christians, like myself, struggle to find the breakthrough that we have been searching for. Through fasting, we can tap into this spiritual weapon and bring about this breakthrough.

1.6 – Fasting and the Christian Life

• **Fasting is:** "The willful abstaining from natural pleasures for a spiritual purpose". Dr. Myles Monroe ("What Is Fasting?" Video).

1.7 – The Day of Atonement

• The **exclusive fast commanded** by the **Mosaic Law** is observed annually on the Day of Atonement (*Yom Kippur*, יוֹם *yôm, לפּרִים kippurîm*).

1.8 – The Day of Atonement

- Yom Kippur is the conclusion to the **Ten Days of Repentance** that began with **Rosh HaShanah**, (Jewish New Year).
- Yom Kippur is the **holiest day** of the Jewish Year.

1.9 – The Day of Atonement

- The *Cohen HaGadol* (High Priest) would **lay both hands** on the head of a live goat, confess **all wickedness** and **rebellion** of the children of Israel. The goat is then led into the wilderness and released.
- **Yom Kippur** the High Priest would enter the Holy of Holies and make atonement for the nation of Israel.

1.10 - The Day of Atonement

- The observance of *Yom Kippur* is characterized by a sense of peace because our confidence is in our relationship with God and His provision for atonement.
- Both Messianic and Secular Jews observe Yom Kippur by fasting and refraining from all work.
- All Jews begin a 25-hour fast and greet friends and family for two days.

1.11 - The Day of Atonement (Lev. 23:26-30)

• The LORD said to Moses, "The tenth day of this seventh month is the Day of Atonement. Hold a sacred assembly and **deny yourselves**, and present a food offering to the LORD. Do not do any work on that day, because it is the Day of Atonement, when atonement is made for you before the LORD your God. Those who do not **deny themselves** on that day must be cut off from their people. I will destroy from among their people anyone who does any work on that day".

1.12 - The Day of Atonement (Lev. 23:31-32)

• "You shall do no work at all. This is to be a **lasting ordinance for the generations to come, wherever you live**. It is a day of sabbath rest for you, and you must **deny yourselves**. From the evening of the ninth day of the month until the following evening you are to observe your sabbath" (cf. Lev. 16:29-31; 25:9; Num. 29:7-11).

1.13 – The Day of Atonement

- "deny themselves".
- "afflict your souls".
- "afflict yourselves".

1.14 - The Day of Atonement

- The Hebrew phrase "must be cut off" means "to cut down", "to exterminate".
- "to be a lasting ordinance for the generations to come, wherever you live" in Hebrew it means "a statute of eternity to your generation in all your dwelling places".

1.15 – The Day of Atonement

- Anyone who disobeyed God's command would be **excommunicated from the community of Israel**.
- This fast was "to be a lasting ordinance" (Hebrew "legal obligation") and referred to the "Day of Atonement" or "the fast" (Acts 27:9) depending upon the translation.

- a. we're hungry for God's Word and the Holy Spirit in our lives.
- b. we long for God's glory to resound in the church and God's praise to resound among the nations.
- c. we yearn for the Son of God to return and Kingdom of God to come.
- d. we want God more than we want anything this world has to offer us.
